Economic Ramifications:

The economic impact of the conflict has been devastating, with infrastructure destruction, disturbed supply chains, and investor uncertainty. The World Bank estimates that the cumulative cost of the conflict to Ukraine's economy would reach \$100 billion by 2025. In Russia, there are rapidly growing expenditures, increasing inflation, and a tight labor market reflecting a loss of workers. Their gross domestic product (GDP) has dropped by 2.1% and their economy will continue to slowly collapse. This economic strain exacerbates social inequalities and hampers recovery efforts in conflict-affected areas. The US gas prices rising after Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022 and later getting economic sanctions imposed on them is a good example of this.

Cultural Resilience:

Despite the adversity they face, the people of Ukraine have demonstrated remarkable resilience and cultural strength. So far, about \$411 billion is needed to restore energy, housing, critical and social infrastructure, and to provide basic needs for the most vulnerable. From this crisis, a new hope emerged from all of the citizens. Artists, writers, and musicians began and have been continuing to create and innovate contemporary pieces to express how united Ukraine is as a whole and what all it has done for them. On the other hand, in Russia, many people are living on relatively low income, their lifestyle being food, clothing, shelter, and mostly spending

money in an incredibly conservative way to make the best out of the resources they're given. Although the situation is incredibly heated and controversial, Ukraine is able to make the best out of it.

Prospects for Peace:

Despite the ongoing violence and instability, there are glimmers of hope for a peaceful resolution to the conflict. Diplomatic negotiations, grassroots peace initiatives and civil society engagement offer pathways to reconciliation and healing. The people of Ukraine and Russia aspire to a future free from fear and violence, where their rights and dignity are respected, and their voices are heard.
